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Hello neighbors! If you haven't yet already, I would like you to meet Wauwatosa's newly elected alderperson, Amanda Fuerst. Voted in last year, Amanda is a Mayfair Park resident who represents District 7 on the Common Council. Her district includes our neighborhood, Mayfair Park, as well as parts of Fisher Woods (south) and Greenwood Estates (east).

Where did you grow up and what got in you interested in politics?

I grew up in Appleton, WI and when I turned 18 I accepted a scholarship to spend a year in Germany. Living abroad was the first time I started following politics, as discussing politics was normal with strangers over there. When I returned home, I furthered my interest in politics by getting a degree in International Studies (Illinois Wesleyan). I then went on to earn my masters at Northwestern University. I never imagined running for office. However, I soon realized we can't just sit around talking about the issues, but we need to be involved instead. When I saw no one was running for our district last year I knew it was time to step up. I absolutely love Mayfair Park, especially how friendly the neighbors are and how easy it is to meet one another.

What do you wish to accomplish as a council member in the next few years?

One goal is to have the city invest in the westside [of town], like it has for other parts of Wauwatosa. Following the lead of previous council members, I wanted to obtain our first park. Although the final concept is not completed, I am excited for it to have its own character and identity, reflective of the neighborhood and its amazing residents. On the financial affairs committee, we requested the westside to be included in the upcoming comprehensive plan to provide developmental guidance for North Ave, from Mayfair Rd. to 124th St. This is the first step towards developing a neighborhood plan, similar to what the city did to revitalize other businesses around town. I hope to see Mayfair Park become more walkable to restaurants, cafes, and other local business. Also to see crime decrease with buildings no longer vacant, and hopefully see the westside be more walkable and bikeable to other parts of the city.



What are your philosophies and goals? What are some challenges you see in the next few years?

I view myself as a public servant and approach my position to oversee taxpayer dollars, to ensure Wauwatosa is thriving now and in the years to come. A challenge is to decide what to fund as there are many great ideas, but we don't have unlimited funds. We've been told that despite the incredible work of the city and finance director, we are still headed for a "financial cliff" over the next 5-6 years if the state doesn't change its municipal funding. As the vice chair to the Financial Affairs Committee I take advantage of the opportunity to oversee and question the spending of our tax dollars to ensure we are keeping our city on track to provide the same great services we as residents expect.

How do you feel about the current housing market, and having enough affordable homes for start-up families?

As Wauwatosa remains a desirable place to live, with very little space to grow unless it's up, the housing market will always be a huge challenge. Since 2015, only 16 new single-family homes have been built. A recent housing study confirmed Wauwatosa's housing shortage, but the most interesting take away is that any new development will help alleviate all economic tiers of the city's housing. Surprisingly the most significant housing shortage, by income tier, is with the most affluent group. This shortage is squeezing out availability of middle tier housing, which extends the issue again to the most affordable housing. We (common council) are very supportive of new developments in Wauwatosa that integrate affordable housing into new housing projects, and I am glad the city continues to find ways to work with developers on this important issue.

FARMERS MARKETS

Tosa Farmers Market runs from June 4th through October 15th each Saturday from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. at 7720 Harwood Ave (Hart Mills Parking Lot).

Every Saturday, this open-air market will host roughly 45 farmers and food producers, selling a mix of produce, flowers, baked goods, cheese, coffee, waffles, popsicles, fish, meat and poultry, and prepared breakfast and dinner items. The first Saturday of each month, they add a Makers Market, featuring a selection of local artisans selling handmade arts and crafts.

- Burleigh Street southbound entrance ramp to I-41


